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THE YEAR IN REVIEW



On behalf of the board of directors, club management, and staff, we wish you and your family health, happiness, and prosperity in the New Year!

As I write my last Nagonie letter, we are finishing up our year-end closing for 2016. This letter is one of my final member communications over a 19-year career with the club and community. In September 1997, I arrived just as the Apache golf course was

being finished, with four more clubhouses, a state-of-the art performance center, and two golf courses yet to be built. My time here has been a wonderful journey for my family, and professional career with the greatest achievement being the transfer of ownership from the developer to the membership in 2011. To date we now have successfully completed six years of sustainable operations, staff transfer, and governance, of the second largest club in the country. I truly thank the membership, the club boards, and staff who all worked together to achieve what the industry has reported as the blueprint for a successful Club transfer. As we start the New Year, I remain dedicated to assisting the club board in locating the next Chief Executive Officer/General Manager, and transferring day to day operations by the end of March 2017. I will also continue to be available to the club's management staff and board through April 2019 when called upon. This mountain will forever be a milestone in my career, as I move on to be part of building, developing, and managing new communities and clubs in the future.

CHARITIES

The charity component of all our organizations and individual members across the Mountain have continued to be very impactful to the community. The Desert Mountain Community Foundation (DMCF) supports our team of employees at the Club and the DMMA/HOA and it is remarkable to share that in the first four years of DMCF's existence, they have provided over \$120,000 to employees and members of employee's families through scholarships. This employee benefit certainly makes Desert Mountain Club and the HOA an attractive place to work. A special thank you to Carol Fox, Troy Gillenwater, Derek Hill, Steve Ketterer, Ann Melsheimer, Pete Redding, Sheila Seaton and Brook Urban.

Keeping with the employee theme, thank you to all of you who contributed to the employee Holiday Fund. This year the total amount distributed to our hourly employees was in excess of \$441,000.

In addition, I want to thank the membership for your generosity in supporting and participating in our charitable golf tournaments held at the Club: CARE, Youth Angels, Ronald McDonald House Charities, Marine Corp Law Enforcement and Phoenix Children's Hospital.

2016 - A YEAR OF BUILDING

We upgraded The Ranch trailhead with new picnic pavilions with the continued support from member donors and sponsors. I invite members to donate as this club amenity is a 'work of art, not yet complete' and will continue to evolve over time as the premier outdoor gateway to our northern properties. Someday I hope to see a larger catering party barn, mountain bike trails, a series of zip lines, and a dedicated seated bike and trail lift to the "china wall" at the top of our private trails. The Sonoran Club remodel and expansion concluded after a long construction period over 16-months, not without challenges, and a great deal of patience from the members. We held a successful grand opening for the membership on October 26, 2016. I am proud to report that the \$12M project was delivered on time and on budget despite a tough construction labor market. I am thankful to the Kitchell Contractors for staying to their agreement without fail despite having so many issues with

their sub-contractors. A memorial appreciation plaque positioned left of the grand entryway will list all who served as advisors, the boards, and club management. This new amenity has begun to re-position the club as not only known for great signature golf, but also for a quality modern fitness, spa, tennis, and wellness center that our members have come to expect. Through this installation the Desert Mountain Club once again is the first in the marketplace with this high-end facility, same as The Jim Flick Golf Performance Center, which has yet to be surpassed by any Club in our competitive market. This has brought a renewed sense of pride as we see members touring family and friends around the new facility each day. Today our lifestyle membership has grown to 137 memberships and will reach capacity and a wait list in 2017.

2016 - CHARLES SCHWAB CUP CHAMPIONSHIP

This was the last in a series of our contracted Senior Tour Championship Tournaments, holding events in 2012, 2014, 2015 and 2016. The overall net benefit and gain for the Club was a return to the national televised golf tournament scene in a crowded golf marketplace. The events brought a national focus for the community, real estate, and the club.

To summarize, in the fourth year of hosting the event, the club received the most visits to the external website than at any other time, had greater market reach, better quality broadcast advertising placement, and secured more online press releases and calendar placements over 2015, along with other tools, to boost Desert Mountain's presence worldwide.

The external website, www.desertmountain.com, had more visits and page views during tournament week than the previous three tournament weeks in 2012, 2014 and 2015. Here are some highlights:

- 11.47% more visits to the home page during 2016 tournament week over 2015 (39, 060 in 2,016; 35,042 in 2015)
- A total of 61,689 page views, an increase of more than 3,500 from 2015
- 16,804 record page views on Saturday, November 12 (average in any given week is 400-600 daily)

The tournament and related advertising has continued to provide numerous sales tied to each tournament play and a broad membership prospect list averaging 40 plus leads per tournament. A big thank you to over 300 member and local volunteers who dedicated countless hours toward this great event, and a dedicated club management team and staff that made the dream come to life. Also to Mike Scully, Director of Golf, and Shawn Emerson, Director of Agronomy and his agronomy team for presenting the Cochise golf course on television with course conditions that many viewers would hope to someday play or achieve at their home courses.

PARCEL 19

This transaction is on track with the developer entitlements, and we anticipate closing in the first quarter of 2017. Bill Brownlee - M3 LLC and their partners, the Real Estate Committee, and Club Management finished the entitlement process and received zoning approval from the City of Scottsdale on December 1, 2016. This concludes the purchase and sale agreement requirements to reach a final closing. This will be a landmark event for the club as it will provide up to 190 deed restricted homes and memberships, new amenities - a clubhouse, and a par 3 executive course. The club and the course will be available to all the membership and accessible through a gated entry off Cave Creek Road. Golf operations will also be accessible by golf cart via the Renegade golf course pro shop and practice area. A big thank you to our Real Estate Committee: Chairman and Club President Joe Maslick, Chuck Harrison, Harold Eastridge, Steve Draizin and Scott Urdang for their dedication in assisting club management through this sales and development process.

Also in 2016, the club received four major industry awards - The

"Emerald" Distinguished Clubs of America award – for outstanding operations, the 5-Star Platinum Club Award for 2016-2018. The Club has been a 5 Star Platinum Club since 2000, but this year the Club achieved a ranking of #25 in the National Market), America's Healthiest Clubs, The PGA Merchandiser of the Year award – for Mark Thush, Director of Retail Operations for the Club.

Who are the Employees of DMC?



Keli Greenberg, Executive Director of Human Resources

We employ 530 regular full-time employees, and they work year-round. Our seasonal staff comprises 74 H2B Visa, 45 full-time non-visa, and nearly 100 part-time non-visa employees. We have 245 unique ughout the Mountain

job descriptions throughout the Mountain.

In the course of a typical year, we will hire or rehire almost 400 employees. Over 200 are seasonal, part-time or interns, and slightly less than 200 are regular full-time employees. Of the regular full-time employees, 65% of our new hires or rehires are employed for our agronomy team, working in jobs at one of our 6 golf courses or with our landscaping department. This type of work is very labor intensive and most employees are scheduled to work 6 days a week, starting as early as 5:00 in the morning.

The average length of service of our regular full-time employees in agronomy is nearly 5 years, while all other departments represent an average of nearly 8 years as a Desert Mountain employee.



The typical commute for our employees is 26 miles with a 45 minutes one-way drive time. In other words, collectively our employees drive over 8,000,000 miles annually to and from work. In order to fill the gap of being located in an area without a public transportation option, we offer a van pool program that carries nearly 200 employees to work each day, 7 days per week.

Our employee demographics includes an average age of 40; we are 70% male and 30% female; we speak 12 different languages including Burmese, French, Russian, Tagalog, Chin and Arabic. Our marital status is split 50/50 among a single or married selection. We live in one of 90 different zip codes throughout the Phoenix Metropolitan area.

Together, we share a passion for Desert Mountain and are committed to living The DM Way. Each day, our mission is to make Desert Mountain one of the finest private residential and lifestyle communities in the world, by providing superior service and outstanding amenities in an atmosphere of excellence!

Born and raised in Napa Valley, Lucero has spent over two decades in the hospitality industry, and developed his palate on the dining room floors of restaurants such as The French Laundry, The Little Nell, and Daniel Boulud (Las Vegas). A dedicated wine ambassador, Lucero was named Best New Sommelier in the United States by

Wine & Spirits in 2011, and was honored by Court of Master Sommeliers as a recipient of the Remi Krug Cup, a recognition reserved for the highestscoring sommeliers who pass all three sections of the prestigious exam on the first attempt. He joined Jackson Family Wines in October 2013. As the National Director of Wine Education, Lucero travels the nation advancing the awareness of food and wine culture. Lucero also holds a degree in Culinary Arts by the Napa Valley Cooking School.

WINE DINNERS

January 31 – Pride Winery

Pride Mountain Vineyards sits high atop the Mayacamas Mountains straddling the Napa/Sonoma county line. Located at the site of historic Summit Ranch, where wine grapes have been grown since 1869, this beautiful setting includes wine caves dug deep into the mountains and the haunting ruins of an old stone winery dating to 1890.

Founded in 1990 by Jim and Carolyn Pride, Pride Mountain Vineyards is recognized as one of the "world's greatest wine estates" by Robert Parker, Jr., joining just 22 other California wineries for this distinction. Pride wines have appeared numerous times on The Wine Spectator's Top 100 Wines of the World list, and have been served at the White House more than 30 times during the last two decades. In 2004, Suzanne Pride Bryan and Steve Pride took ownership of the winery after their father, Jim's, passing and now continue Pride Mountain Vineyards' tradition of producing highly lauded wines. In the cellar, winemaker Sally Johnson and her team work with the property's exceptional estate-grown cabernet sauvignon, merlot, cabernet franc, syrah, sangiovese and chardonnay to produce world-class cuvées deserving of a place in any serious collector's cellar. The cost is \$120 per person.

Vintner Agustin Huneeus has been discovering great vineyards of the world throughout a career in wine spanning five decades and 15 countries.

Agustin and wife Valeria founded the Quintessa estate in the renowned Rutherford District of Napa Valley in 1990 and after years of running global wine companies, established a family portfolio of wines that represent the finest vineyard estates, appellations and wines in both North and South America. In addition to the Quintessa estate, Agustin's current vineyard and winery projects include Faust Napa Valley Cabernet Sauvignon and Illumination Napa Valley Sauvignon Blanc.

In 2009, the Huneeus family forged a partnership with Joan and Walt Flowers of Flowers Vineyards & Winery, pioneering vintners who in 1989, established two extraordinary vineyards dedicated to world-class Chardonnay and Pinot Noir in the extreme Sonoma Coast.

Their son Agustin F. Huneeus has worked in the family business for more than 20 years and extends the family tradition as head of the wine portfolio in the US and abroad. The cost is \$120 per person.

CREOLE BUTTER FOR GRILLED OYSTERS



INGREDIENTS:

- 3/4 cup Butter, unsalted
- 1 each Lemon Juice, fresh
- 1 Tbsp. Garlic, finely chopped
- 1 Tbsp. Chives, finely chopped
- 2 Tbsp. Parsley, finely chopped

DIRECTIONS:

- 1. Using the paddle in a table top mixer, beat all ingredients until combined.
- 2. Roll out plastic wrap on countertop and place butter onto the wrap in the center of the table.
- 3. Wrap butter with plastic and roll into the form of a log or tootsie roll.
- 4. Place in the refrigerator and allow to cool.
- 5. Place freshly shucked oysters on the half shell onto grill and cook until the oyster liquid begins to boil.
- 6. Cut 1/4 inch coins of creole butter and place on top of oysters.
- 7. Cook until butter is boiling and finish with a fresh squeeze of lemon.



— PACE OF PLAY — BEGINS WITH YOU!

As we gear up for a busy four months, we would like to remind you that one of the biggest concerns and focal points that the golf operation has is the pace of play. A successful pace starts with the player! The following tips are a combination of successful practices that were used in the past at Desert Mountain and at other world class golf facilities. We invite you to take a brief moment and review these helpful tips.

- Play Ready Golf (with the exception of match play) A good way to be certain that you are playing ready golf is to not only be ready while the other player is over his/her golf shot, but to be at your ball (if it is not in the other players line of sight) rather than waiting beside them along with the other players.
- Putt out if you're not interfering with anyone's line. Ask if you may finish out, take a moment to read the putt and go ahead with your stroke, even if someone else is away.
- Drop your cart companion off at his/her ball and proceed to your ball or grab a few clubs and walk to your ball.
- Offer to take the cart around the green if the other player can walk up to his/her shot. If need be, help bring up the cart of the lone rider as well.
- While proceeding to your second shot, think about what you are going to hit so that you already have confidence in the shot and have the desired club.
- When you arrive at the next tee, record scores from the previous hole. Count the scores as you go along so you don't have to do so at the tee. Announce to the scorekeeper your score so he/she doesn't have to ask after each hole.
- Know the equitable stroke control guidelines; how to take your maximum score and your most likely score.
- Have your playing partners watch your ball and notify them before you tee off if they could help you watch your ball.
- Reference where your ball landed with landmarks around the course (Right of the large cactus.)
- When in doubt about what to chip/pitch with, take all of your wedges to the green to prevent having to run back and forth to the cart.
- If one player hits it from one bunker to the next, offer to rake the bunker for him/her.
- With position in mind, always look forward, not behind. Stay with the group in front of you and always strive to play each hole in 13 minutes.

As always, know that the staff on the course is there to help and notification of pace issues is only for the overall enjoyment of all members and their guests on the courses. If you have any questions, it would be the Professionals Staffs' pleasure to be your aid.



Make Your New Year's Resolution to Enhance Your Short Game

The Jim Flick Golf Performance Center is enhancing its ability to maximize the efficiency in a players swing The short game is the most important part of scoring well. A 10 yard chip shot counts the same as a 250 yard drive, which makes playing the correct wedges just as important as playing the correct driver. Selecting the correct loft is relatively easy and is based on how far you need each club to go. The length and type of shaft will typically correspond with your irons. But one of the most important and least well know aspects of a wedge is the amount of bounce it has.

Bounce is the angle created between the ground and the sole of the club. It describes how much higher the leading edge of the club sits than the trailing edge. The bounce of the club influences how the club contacts the earth. You want to select wedges that work with your unique swing shape to help the club glide through the turf without digging too much. Proper contact with the ground will ultimately make it easier to execute the delicate shots around the greens and shave strokes off your score.

To give you a better understanding of how wedge bounce works, we have outlined some of the ways bounce influences your shots:

The greater the bounce on a club the less it will dig into the ground upon impact. This means you want to use high bounce clubs on soft surfaces and especially for bunker or desert shots where your ball is resting on a lot of loose sand. The smaller the bounce on a club the more it will dig into the ground upon impact. This means you want to use low bounce clubs on hard surfaces that feel similar to a cart path or for buried lies where the club must dig deep into the sand to get to the base of the golf ball. You can change the effective bounce on a club by opening or closing the clubface.

- Open your club face to create more bounce and more loft
- · Close your club face to create less bounce and less loft
- De-lofting the club face while keeping it pointed square to the target (often called a forward press) will decrease bounce and loft

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

It is the Mission of the Youth Angels Foundation to assist young people in achieving their life goals by providing them a financial helping hand to pursue higher education.

Yazmeen Quintero is the standard bearer for the Youth Angels Foundation. She is the first of the many recipients of Youth Angels support to graduate from college, (December 13, 2016). Here is her commentary about a life better traveled:

"My childhood largely differed in comparison to most individuals. I was married and had a baby girl at the young age of sixteen. By the time I was eighteen-years-old, I found out I was expecting another baby girl. With good news, came bad news. My mother was diagnosed with stage four breast cancer. She encouraged me to go back to school and quit my minimum

wage job. I took her up on her suggestion and my husband found a GED school for me called Las Artes (supported by the Youth Angels Found.) I attended Las Artes for three months and successfully passed my GED exam. Soon after, I was told about a scholarship opportunity from the school counselor. I applied and hoped for the best. Next thing I knew, I was receiving the best news that I had received in a long time. I had been awarded a scholarship from the Youth Angels Foundation! I began attending Arizona State University in 2012. My mother was so proud of me and expressed her love and support throughout this exciting time of my life. I did however; lose my mother in June of 2014 to cancer. When I lost my mother, I felt so weak and did not think that I would be able to go on with life. I fell into a depression for three months until I pulled myself out of that dark place."

Imagine her life now unfolding with just a small "hand up."

"Fast forward to now, I am in my senior year at Arizona State University. Throughout my time as a college student, I have expanded my intelligence level and gained experience that I will need in my future profession. My two girls are now ages nine and six, my husband is a plumber, I work double weekends as a receptionist at a retirement community, and intern with the Family Court Administration at the Maricopa Superior Court. I am set to graduate in December of this year with a Bachelor's degree in Criminal Justice and Criminology and a minor in Public Administration and Public Management."

What about her future?


"So what's next? My plan is to begin job searching within the court system as soon as I graduate. Working for the courts is ideal for me because I will be involved in the justice field without having to directly face the dangers that could arise when working in this field. Not to mention the set schedule and great benefits. Once I secure a position, I plan to work for a year and situate myself with my new profession before returning to school. Once I have my schedule set, I will begin pursuing a Master's degree in Public Safety Leadership and Administration or Management and Homeland Security. I have done my research on both degrees and have determined that both masters programs will aid me in furthering my expertise level in the justice field."

Would this have been possible without our help? Maybe, but why take the chance.

"I look forward to these milestones in my life and cannot be more thankful for the support that I have received along the way. My life has been enriched since the day that the Youth Angels became a part of my life. When I was awarded the opportunity to attend any college of my choice, I had a mixture of feelings from honor to disbelief. The Youth Angels are not only generous, but they are passionate about helping ambitious youth. Erika Greaves is the chairman of the Youth Angels Foundation. However, I also consider Erika my life coach. Erika is truly an extraordinary woman who has shown me nothing but love and inspiration. Erika and the Youth Angels Foundation went above and beyond to support me in any way possible in order to see me succeed. If it was not for their belief in me and the support that they have provided me, I do not know if I would be in the position that I am in today. Words can never explain the appreciation that I have for this incredible foundation."

Do we need to say much else? Youth Angels worked with the Valley of the Sun YMCA to provide educational opportunities for hundreds of kids. Since refocusing through the Arizona Community Foundation in 2013 Youth Angels has selected seven students for college scholarships. Most of them have come from military families or are currently serving in the Arizona National Guard.






